Topic: Providing access to reading platforms to promote reading schools during the Literacy month

Message Objectives are to:

- Promote reading in primary schools.
- Maximise reading strategies in primary schools.
- Increase the number of learners participating in reading activities in schools.
- Promote reading during literacy month.

The National Education Collaborations Trust together with the Department of Basic Education has recently launched a ONE MILLION Storybooks project at Hlalisanani Primary School in Kwa Mhlanga (Mpumalanga Province). The Storybooks were written in 9 Indigenous languages to promote reading in mother tongue to learners in 8882 primary schools across all 9 provinces. As we are still in Literacy month, it is important to have a variety of reading resources to champion reading at schools and in homes. There are two approaches to connecting people to reading resources i.e., through accessing hard copies of books and through digital copies.

Accessing hard copies of books

- Borrow books from a local library.
- Borrow books from a better-resourced school for a specific time. Then exchange and borrow more books on the same basis.
- All schools will have Rainbow Workbooks, which contain stories.
- Ask for access to resource storage spaces at schools. You may find old books or textbooks. Pick out interesting stories and non-fiction texts. With the help of the teacher mentor, organize these according to learner levels. You can MAKE THESE FUN to read and listen to by using the strategies and activities described in the previous sections.
